Based on the medieval almanac tradition, *Reportorios* contain vast assortments of information related to the issue of time, as does the *Mexicanus*. Diel masterfully demonstrates that, just as *Reportorios* were used as guides to living in early modern Spain, likewise the *Codex Mexicanus* provided its Nahua audience a guide to living in colonial New Spain.
