Memoirs from Beyond the Grave: 1800-1815 François-Réne Chateaubriand 2022-09-27 The second part of an infamous memoir about life in the time of Napoleon by a rebellious literary celebrity. Reading Realism in Stendhal Ann Jefferson 1988-03-10 This book poses the question: what happens when reading enters the realist process? and answers it by way of a critical study of Stendhal's writing. Ann Jefferson argues that a recognition of the role of reading in representation is particularly crucial to an understanding of Stendhal's realism, and her account includes substantial discussions of *De l'Amour*, *Le Rouge et le Noir*, the *Vie de Henry Brulard* and *La Chartreuse de Parme*. Her study also draws a number of illuminating parallels between Stendhal and aspects of modern critical theory, and uses them in order to reveal the high degree of sophistication and self-consciousness in Stendhal's writing, qualities which are attributed here to the intensity of his preoccupation with his readers. By focusing on the issue of reading in

Stendhal this book not only proposes a reassessment of Stendhal's own work, but also opens up lines of enquiry on the critical problem that is realism.

Cross-cultural tensions are examined in essays on the Christian appropriation of Aztec symbolism, and on Jesuit perspectives in an imperial Chinese garden in Beijing. Architectural origins and education are revisited in essays on fire and language in Vitruvius, on storytelling by Spanish theorist Juan Caramuel de Lobkowitz, and on the role of history in the design of the Prato della Valle, a public square in Padua. Iris Origo (1902-1988) was a British-born biographer and writer. She lived in Italy and devoted much of her life to the improvement of the Tuscan estate at La Foce, which she purchased with her husband in the 1920s. During the Second World War, she sheltered refugee children and assisted many escaped Allied prisoners of war and partisans in defiance of Italy's fascist regime and Nazi occupation forces. Pushkin Press also publishes her bestselling war diary, *War in Val d'Orcia*, as well as two of her biographies, *A Study in Solitude: The Life of Leopardi - Poet, Romantic and Radical* and *The Last Attachment: The Story of Byron and Teresa Guiccioli*.
